Syrett challenges this assumption in his sweeping and sometimes shocking history of youthful marriage in America. Focusing on young women and girls--the most common underage spouses--Syrett tracks the marital history of American minors from the colonial period to the present, chronicling the debates and moral panics related to these unions. Although the frequency of child marriages has declined since the early twentieth century, Syrett reveals that the practice was historically far more widespread in the United States than is commonly thought. It also continues to this day: current estimates

indicate that 9 percent of living American women were married before turning eighteen. By examining the legal and social forces that have worked to curtail early marriage in America--including the efforts of women's rights activists, advocates for children's rights, and social workers--Syrett sheds new light on the American public's perceptions of young people marrying and the ways that individuals and communities challenged the complex legalities and cultural norms brought to the fore when underage citizens, by choice or coercion, became husband and wife.

Love and Marriage in the Age of Chaucer-H.A. Kelly 2004-01-30

The result is a fascinating, multi-generational study of the lives of couples around the world as they negotiate their relationships in the twenty-first century.

Age at Marriage and Subsequent Marital Experience-Robert Parke (Jr) Data for males from the one-in-a-thousand sample of the 1960 Census are used to study the relationships between marital stability, age at marriage, and education. Eighty-seven percent of the men who first married between 1945 and 1954, were in an intact first marriage at the time of the census; for 13 percent, the first marriage was not intact. Maximum marital stability characterized the men who first married around the median age at first marriage, which was 24.0 years; marital stability was progressively lower for men who first married above this age as well as for men who first married below this age. Greater instability of marriage for the men who married relatively late in life is only partially attributable to the greater risks of widowhood to which the older men are exposed. Detailed data by marital status in 1960 indicate that the marriages of these men are more likely than the average to end up in divorce or separation. Additional data support the previously observed positive relationship of age at first marriage to education and the inverse relationship of marital stability to education. Furthermore, the association of marital stability with age at first marriage is shown to be independent of the association of marital stability with education. These findings are based on test data developed for the 1960 Census reports on Marital Status and Age at First Marriage, which are in preparation and will be published later in 1965. Public examinations in developing countries play a critical role in the selection of students for participation in the educational system. The exams dictate what is taught, how it is taught, and what is and is not learned. They are academic, have little reference to the everyday lives of the students, are limited to pencil-and-paper tests, and are biased toward high-achievers. Thus, students who leave school at an early stage are provided with inadequate opportunities for acquiring relevant knowledge and skills. This study identifies practices associated with examinations that may create inequities for some students.
